## **Budding** new business

#### By Kathy O'Reilly

Port Alice has a budding new business.

The village is the latest North Island community to have a retail cannabis store.

Work is currently underway on the new store in the FP Foods Plaza.

At the March 12, 2025 council meeting, a proposal from Derek Koel of Mainland Cannabis 247 Ltd. to open the store was considered.

"In 2024, The Village of Port Alice updated our Zoning Bylaw to include provisions for Cannabis Retail Sales. As the proposal fit the provisions in the Zoning Bylaw, the Council was in favour of the proposal," said Chief Administrative Officer Bonnie Danyk.

At its June 25, 2025, meeting Council reviewed a letter from the BC Liquor and Cannabis Regulation Branch (LCRB) regarding the application and voted in favour of the application.

# Grant pays for new breakwater for Alice marina

Port Alice has a new

marine hazards like wind-driven waves. previous "The

breakwater for our marina was comprised of logs/boom sticks. These logs had severely deteriorated and had minimal anchoring. This caused the previous breakwater to move around a lot, and logs to break free," said Econom-Development Officer Ryan Nicholson.

"This resulted in logs becoming a threat to boats around our marina, and to the general waters surrounding us. The previous breakwater vided little to no protection and constantly put our marine infrastructure at risk," Nicholson explained.

This was particularly bad in the winter, resulting in minimal use of the marina in the off season. "We are hopeful that this new and improved engineered

system, with significantly more anchoring, will provide a much safer marina that is used throughout more of the year."

The project is not quite complete, so there is not a final cost yet. The breakwater was quoted to be approximately \$300,000.

# Health gains and inequities highlighted

Island Health's Chief Medical Health Officer has released her 2025 Population Health Status Report, offering an in-depth look at the health of people across the region with a focus on children and youth.

Among the positive trends, the report notes a 41 per cent drop in child and youth poverty between 2016 and 2021. childhood immunization rates that now exceed the provincial average, and declining rates of substance island health use and self-harm among youth.

"This report shows that progress is possible, and already happening," said Dr. Réka Gustafson, Island Health's chief medical health officer and vice president of population and public health.

"From decreasing child poverty rates to improved youth mental health, we're seeing positive shifts that reflect the strength and resilience of our communities," Dr. Gustafson said.

The report also notes declining life expectancy and differences in health outcomes driven by social determinants of health including geography and income.

Life expectancy varies by up to eight years depending on where people live within the region, with men disproportionately affected by premature mortality, largely due to unregulated drug poisonings.

Residents continue to use more tobacco, cannabis, and alcohol compared to the rest of the province despite an overall decline in use.

The region has also seen increased cases of communicable diseases including syphilis and tuberculosis, with housing insecurity being a risk factor.

idence to shape policy and promoting healthier public attitudes and policies around substance use, we can begin to shift the culture."

The report also highlights ongoing mental health challenges among youth, including a notable decline in their sense of community connection since 2018. While some indicators are trending in a positive direction, overall youth mental health has yet to rebound to pre-pandemic levels.

Dr. Gustafson says sustained health promotion and prevention activities are key. "To make a real difference, we must intervene early, work collaboratively across sectors, and focus on the social conditions that shape health," said Dr. Gustafson. "These are not just health system issues - they are community-wide challenges."

The report is intended to serve as an engagement tool to support dialogue among public health staff, clinicians, local governments, and community organizations across the Island Health region.

In British Columbia, medical health officers have the statutory responsibility to monitor and report on the health of the population, providing advice on public health issues and the implementation of relevant health promotion and protection policies.

# Alice has Annex condition assessment done

The Village of Port Alice is taking steps to determine the future of the Quatsino Chalet Annex located at 1113 Nigei Street.

On Oct. 7, 2024, the Annex was auctioned at the annual tax sale. There were no bidders on the property, so the Village of Port Alice was deemed the purchaser.

"I am currently in the process of transferring the title to the Village of Port Alice," said Chief Administrative Officer Bonnie Danyk in a report to council.

"The Village of Port Alice Council will need to decide if they would like to sell the building at market value or if they want to renovate it and use it for housing," Danyk said. There is a strong need on the North Island for both subsidized seniors housing and employee housing for health care and service sector workers.

"I would recommend that one of the first tasks to be done is a condition assessment on the building. This will give us a baseline of what will need to be repaired immediately as well as an understanding of what services are shared with the Quatsino Hotel (heating, hydro) and what the process would be to sever them. The Village should also work on making the building more secure and consider adding an alarm system."

If the Village decides to keep the building and renovate it for housing, they will need to fund it. Current programs such as the Federal Government 'Build Canada Home' and the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) 'Affordable Housing Fund' are for new builds only. CMHC has an 'Apartment Construction Loan Program: Seniors Rental Housing' but there is a minimum of 50 units required. There are funding and loan programs with a strong focus on green infrastructure available through the Federation of Canadian Municipalities. BC Housing may also have funding programs or partnerships available.

"Once the condition assessment is done these programs can be researched more thoroughly to see what available options are," Danyk said. At their regular meeting Nov. 12, council agreed to proceed with a condition assessment.

### Snow Goose visits Alert Bay

Over the last month, Alert Bay has been blessed to see a rare visitor.

A juvenile Snow Goose has been foraging and resting down by the Health Centre and field by the U'mista Cultural Centre. There is a concern that it could be hit by a car or injured in some way. It does not seem to be afraid of cars and people. Mars Wildlife Rescue believes the goose has flight exhaustion.

Snow Geese are medium-sized geese that breed from late May to mid-August. But they spend more than half the year flying to and from their warmer winter homes.

Migration begins in late August, with most birds arriving on and staying in fall staging areas from September through November, depending on latitude and influenced by weather conditions. Arrival in wintering areas is from October to December.

During their spring migration, huge groups of Snow Geese fly very high. They (4,800 kilometres) from their travel along specific paths, winter areas to the Arctic flying over 3,000 miles tundra.







# Artist creates whimsical portraits of women

When artist Norma Jean Bone and her sister Cindy closed on their townhouse, they had never even heard of Port Alice.

"My sister and I were thinking about retirement. Tired of renting, we wanted to own our own place, so we started looking on-line for the cheapest homes in all of BC. We were living in Surrey at the time," Norma said.

"Every bid was turned down except for a townhouse in Port Alice. After all the legal stuff was handled and money deposited, we asked ourselves, 'Where is Port Alice?' We had never heard of the place," she explained.

They bought the property sight unseen.

"Although there were some surprises and a lot of TLC that needed to be done, the Lord had given us a perfect home and an amazing view. That was nine years ago."

Norma was born in Saskatchewan, grew up in Calgary, lived in Kamloops and eventually moved to the Vancouver area.

"I have never had a "career" but have had a multitude of jobs from office administration to school janitor, to bus driving, warehouse work, and finally construction, which taught me everything I needed to know to turn our place in Port Alice into a beautiful, cozy home," she said.

From a very early age, her dream was to become a famous artist and to be able to live off earnings from her work. "But life has mostly been about survival. In grade school, I spent most of my time gazing out the window or standing in a corner or sitting in the hallway. The only time I paid attention was during art class."

Her Grade 3 teacher phoned Norma's mom and suggested she enroll her in the Children's Saturday Morning Art Program, for children in Grades 1 to 6, at the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology in Calgary.

"I walked an hour to get there, rain or snow, but it was the highlight of my little life. As a teenager, on into adulthood, I sold my paintings. I love faces and have mostly done portraits in oil or graphite. I lean toward realism."

As an adult Norma has studied at the Alberta Institute of Art, later called Alberta University of the Arts in Calgary; trained under noted artist T.A. Goodchild; and attended Caribou College art programs in Kamloops.

Norma has had some success in various Juried Art Competitions: Federation of Canadian Artists on Granville Island, Vancouver; Burnaby Arts Council Gallery (her first solo exhibition); Gallery on Main, Lacombe, Alberta; Cambridge House International Showcase for Visual Arts, Vancouver. "My motivation and inspiration come from my faith in Jesus. I see His handiwork everywhere."

For several years Norma has been fascinated by seashells. "Each one is intricately constructed with a variety of colours and patterns and magnificent shapes," she explained.

"Unfortunately, their iridescent beauty is hidden on the in-

side, much like us humans. Walking along the beach one day, head down looking for shells, sea glass and unusual rocks, a picture popped into my head of this face with goggles and sea creatures in her hair," she recalled.

"I brushed it off a couple of times until I realized that my God was speaking to me. I saw exactly how to do it; the form,

the strips of material and wool drenched in paint, the glass and how to do the eyes, the shells, the sea creatures and of course the humour," said Norma.

"The possibilities were endless. I was joyously obsessed! Each piece takes several weeks to complete due to drying time before proceeding to the next step. And then there is the hard, tedious task of making the frames which is only made possible by my experience in construction," she said.

"My art is reminiscent of 'Relief Art' in which designs or sculptures are carved into marble, eliminating the background, and causing the figures to stick out. Ancient cultures as well as modern day artists have used this method," she explained.

"I have tried to imitate this ancient art form by using mixed medium and keeping the form as neutral as possible, reflecting the original use of natural stone, marble, wood, etc.," she said.

"I begin with a Styrofoam head, covering it with strips of material saturated in paint to give a textured look. Because I keep it neutral, texture is very important to give it depth and movement."

Norma has presented her whimsical pieces recently at markets in Port McNeill and Port Alice.

"I am so surprised and blessed by the favourable response from the public to my exhibition. Many thanks to everyone who purchased one of my pieces."


