## Filomi Days in jeopardy

If more volunteers do not step up to the plate, Filomi Days could be cancelled this year.

For many years, a small group of dedicated individuals carried the responsibility of planning and delivering this event.

"The executive members that have been with us for some time resigned their positions so they could take time off from volunteering," said Vice Chair Rob Tucker.

"This left the society with only myself in an executive position and two directors who stayed on so we could have a quorum," Tucker said.

As those long-time volunteers have now stepped back, the society has been reaching out to the community to invite new volunteers to help continue this tradition.

Despite multiple requests, no one has come forward.

# Atli Chip to shut down in March due to Crofton closure

The North Island is losing another employer in the forest industry.

Atli Resources LP Chief Executive Officer Jonathan Lok said in a statement that the Atli Chip LP facility in Beaver Cove will close in March due to “ongoing structural changes affecting British Columbia’s coastal forest sector.”

The closure affects nine employees and about 10 contractors.

The company said a major factor was the announcement of the closure of Domtar’s pulp mill in Crofton, BC, which Atli says effectively eliminated the demand for wood chips pro-

duced at Beaver Cove.

Atli, which is co-owned by the ‘Namgis First Nation, says it and its partners, including Domtar, are looking at alternative uses for the site, calling the plant’s closure “a necessary pause” but “not an exit” from Vancouver Island’s forestry sector.

“My heart goes out to the employees of the Atli Chip Plant in Beaver Cove, just outside Port McNeill, who will be losing their jobs less than a month after Christmas,” said North Island-Powell River MP Aaron Gunn in a Facebook post, blaming both provincial and federal government policies.

## Hardy agrees to support Wounded Warrior Run

The District of Port Hardy will once again be throwing financial support behind the Wounded Warrior Run.

At their regular meeting Jan. 13, Council agreed to provide a \$1,000 donation funded from the 2026 Grant-in-Aid budget.

“In 2026, we will be embarking on the 13th annual Wound-

ed Warrior Run BC,” said Director Jacqueline Zweng in a letter requesting funding.

“This event has become the largest fund-raiser for Wounded Warriors Canada in BC, helping our Trauma Exposed Professionals and their families,” Zweng said.

The run will begin in Port Hardy Feb. 22 and end in Victoria March 1.

Wounded Warrior Canada (WWC) is a nationally recognized mental health service provider dedicated to serving ill and injured Trauma Exposed Professionals and their families.

A Trauma Exposed Professional is an individual who, through the course of their regular job duties is continually exposed to traumatic events involving actual or threatened: death, serious injury, and/or sexual violence. Trauma Exposed Professionals include but are not limited to the following professions: Military, Police Officer, Fire Fighter, Paramedic, Corrections Officer, Security Officer, and Health Care.

“Our range of clinically facilitated programs have been developed to support the unique needs of Veterans, First Responders and their families,” she said.

“Our programs support individuals, couples, spouses, surviving Family members, and children of those who serve or have served our country and communities. WWC recognizes that only through ongoing partnerships, multi-organizational collaboration, and sustained community involvement can Trauma Exposed Professionals and their families recover from their injuries and return to a state of well-being in community.”

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# New bike path to Storey's Beach discussed

A desire to have a bike/pedestrian lane on Byng Road was a topic of discussion at the Jan. 13 District of Port Hardy regular council meeting.

"I am writing to you to request consideration for a bike lane to be installed on Byng Road starting from the intersection of Byng Road and Fort Rupert Road to the intersection of Byng Road and Highway 19," said resident Tracy Hamilton in a letter.

"The road significantly narrows at this intersection for the duration of the road to the Highway 19 intersection," Hamilton said, adding there is a 2.3 kilometre stretch which does not have a shoulder lane for pedestrians and cyclists. "There are no streetlights or reflective markers along this road, and the pavement is severely denigrated in several areas making bike riding treacherous," she wrote.

"The speed limit on Byng Road is 60km/h. This requires drivers to allow 1.5 metres between themselves and bike riders. This presents increased risk for drivers as well as the lanes are narrow and there are many blind spots along this route," Hamilton continued.

From 2020 to 2024, ICBC data shows six vehicle accidents along Byng Road.

"I think this speaks to the need for separate bike lanes to ensure pedestrian and cyclists can travel safely

on this road as well as vehicles."

There were 12 vehicle accidents at the intersection of Byng Road and Highway 19 and an additional five accidents at Fort Rupert Road and Highway 19.

"I am mentioning these accidents on Highway 19 because of suggestions that cyclists ride Highway 19 instead of Byng Road, but I feel that route is much more dangerous due to the increased speed of 100km, and the number of transport and large trucks along this route," she continued.

"A bike and pedestrian route from the Ta'yagul (Storey's Beach) and area into Port Hardy could be achieved by restoring the Commuter Trail that starts behind Fort Rupert School and ends on the ferry terminal road," Hamilton said. "I have started a public petition to raise awareness and to help Mayor and Council understand the impact a bike/pedestrian lane along Byng Road would have for the members of the community.

"We have gathered 135 signatures at the date of this letter."

"I think it's pretty challenging to do because a lot of it is the Ministry of Highway's road, it's not the District of Port Hardy's road," said Port Hardy Mayor Pat Corbett-Labatt.

"The Commuter Trail is more of a hike than anything. It's pretty steep and

to actually get into town is quite the trek and I think it's more of a recreational trail," said Councillor Brian Texmo.

"I agree and support the idea, because as a kid trying to ride a bike out to the beach was terrifying and I do believe that there should be something," Texmo said.

"But how do you deal with this when the road is so narrow. It seems kind of monumental in my mind and I don't really know the steps of doing something like this," he continued.

"I'd need to be more educated on how something like this could get done in the first place and what the steps and hoops are to go through are, which sound like they are pretty big," said Texmo.

Council should forward the letter to the Port Hardy Rotary Club and to the Kwakiutl First Nation and ask them for consideration

in making a commuter bike trail and "see if we can move that forward," said

Corbett-Labatt.

"It's well needed, but the alternative would be some

sort of actual grade trail, put in properly, rather than the hike," Texmo said.

get more employers on board as well," said North Island Employment Foundations Society Marketing Coordinator Colleen Wilson.

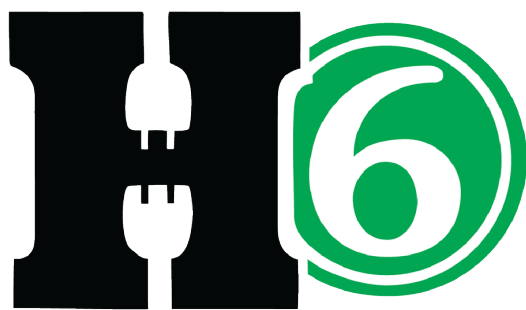

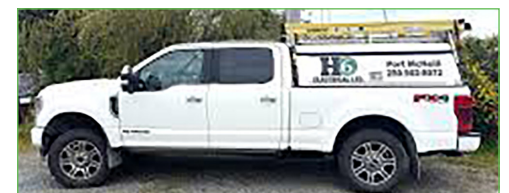

## Hounds of Cuchulain ready to howl in Hardy

The Hounds of Cuchulain, a seven-piece band from Victoria, BC, delivering vibrant performances steeped in Irish, Scottish, English, and original folk music, are the next act in the North Island Concert Society season.

They will be performing Saturday, Feb. 7 at 7 p.m. at the Port Hardy Civic Centre.

Inspired by legends like The Dubliners, The Pogues, The Irish Rovers, The Corries, and The Chieftains, their dynamic shows feature lively dance tunes, historical ballads, engaging stories, and enchanting melodies. The group comprises Wolf Edwards on lead vocals and guitar; Madeleine Townley on tin whistle, Irish harp, and vocals; Briana Kennedy on fiddle and vocals; Dexter Simpson on Irish tenor banjo; Benjamin Garrison on mandolin and vocals; Jeff Feltmate on fiddle and

bodhrán; and Theodore Waite on double bass. With a dedication to sharing their music across diverse communities, The Hounds have performed on over 300 stages since their formation, spanning Vancouver Island, the Gulf Islands, and mainland BC.

This expansive reach includes bringing their energetic performances to major events such as the Victoria Highland Games, ScotFestBC, and the Grey Cup Festival. Over time, he becomes known as Cú Chulainn, or the Hound of Culann, and proves himself as a fierce warrior in Irish mythology, known for his heroic deeds and loyalty.

Given that the myth has Irish, Scottish, English, and Welsh roots, the band felt it an appropriate name. Anyway, it sounds very cool.

"To us, the image of the (Irish) Wolfhound is emblematic of the history and variety of folk music: as a call to action, a racing reel, or music to bring to mind home, hearth, and good company," said Edwards. 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# Foundry to expand services to Port McNeill

More youth on the North Island will benefit from increased access to mental-health and substance-use supports as Foundry expands services to Port McNeill.

Foundry is already in Port Hardy.

“Young people face more pressure and stress every day, and it’s important they have a safe place to turn when life feels overwhelming,” said Josie Osborne, BC Minister of Health.

“With the expansion of Foundry services, youth will have easier access to the trusted mental-health services and programs Foundry provides.”

This new location will help young people and their families access support closer to home. In these communities, young people between 12 and 24 and their caregivers will have access to free, confidential and low barrier supports in person or by connecting virtually to their nearby Foundry centre.

Foundry services include drop-in counselling, peer support, physical and sexual health care, access to groups and workshops, and support with education and employment.

Service availability at each space may vary and will be determined alongside youth and families to reflect community needs.

“Providing more young people with confidential, same-day access to mental-health and substance-use supports within small communities will ensure that youth experiencing challenges can easily connect to supports when they need it,” said Amna Shah, parliamentary secretary for mental health and addictions.

“Expanding Foundry services is an important part of the work we are doing to ensure more young people feel seen, supported and cared for in their own communities.”

Once established, the new location will operate within an existing community space and be an extension of a Foundry centre in a neighbouring city or town.

The same local organization connected to the neighbouring Foundry centre will be operating services at the new location to ensure consistency in programs and services. Port McNeill will operate under the umbrella of the North Island Crisis and Counselling Centre Society and connected to Foundry Port Hardy.

The Province is providing \$1.7 million to Foundry centres to expand service availability in nearby communities, and annual funding toward operations and service delivery to ensure young people have the support they need when they need it.

The Province is committed to expanding Foundry services throughout BC. Enhancing supports for youth living with mental-health and substance-use challenges is an integral part of creating a seamless continuum of care for people in BC.

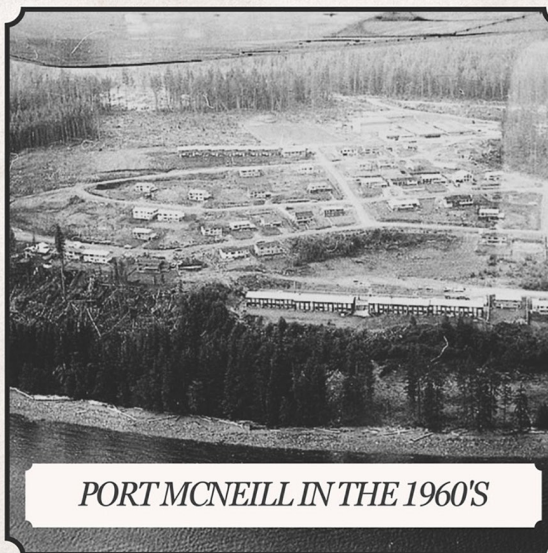
